

Dagsboro has a particular feel to it that is easy to miss if you only drive through on the way to the coast. The roads are quieter than the beach towns, the pace is slower, and the neighborhoods carry a mix of old Delaware character and newer growth. That combination is part of what makes curb appeal matter here. A well-kept driveway, a clean front walk, and a brightened vinyl exterior do more than look good.
