Use Conditions (Float Values)

Aside from rarity, every skin is assigned a **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00, which determines its physical wear and tear.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.44
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00

Keep in mind: Some skins are "wear-capped," indicating they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower-float variations extremely valuable.

The Mathematics of Opening Cases
