The condition of a weapon is categorized into 5 unique tiers based on its Float Value range. It is a common misunderstanding that greater wear always looks worse; some items really look much better with a bit of battle damage, while others end up being seriously stained.



Condition Name Float Value Range Description **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Pristine condition with little to no visible wear, scratches, or fading. **Minimal Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Minor acnes, small scratches, or extremely faint wear on edges. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Visible scratches and wear, though the core artwork stays mainly intact. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Substantial wear, unique paint breaking, and duller colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Heavy damage, seriously chipped paint, and in many cases, a nearly indistinguishable style.

Loadouts are often classified by color or theme to create a cohesive aesthetic in-game. Common styles preferred by the community include:

- **Red & Black:** High-contrast, aggressive loadouts making use of products like the AK-47|Redline and M4A4|Asiimov.
- **Blue Themes:** Serene and icy looks featuring the M4A1-S|Blue Phosphor or USP-S|Cortex.
- **Covert Minimalist:** Clean, downplayed designs that do not distract throughout intense competitive rounds.

The Virtual Economy and Marketplace
