

What carpenter ants are and why they turn up in Brampton homes

Carpenter ants are one of the most troublesome pests for homeowners because they can cause **wood damage** without eating wood like termites do. Instead, they hollow it out to form **nesting sites**, which can lead to **termite-like damage** in support framing, trim, window areas, and damp basement materials.

How to identify carpenter ants among other ants and pests
