Common Window Problems and Solutions

Windows endure extreme temperature fluctuations, wind, rain, and UV exposure daily. As a result, they provide an unique set of maintenance difficulties.

1. Drafty Windows

If you feel a chill near your windows even when they are shut tight, the weatherstripping or caulking has likely weakened.

- **The Fix:** Remove old, brittle caulk around the outside frame and apply a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone. Change damaged foam or vinyl weatherstripping along the sash tracks.

2. Foggy Glass (Failed Insulated Units)

Modern double- or triple-pane windows include a sealed gas layer for insulation. When the seal stops working, condensation forms *between* the panes, developing a long-term haze.

- **The Fix:** In a lot of cases, the insulated glass system (IGU) should be changed instead of the whole window frame. A professional glazier can quickly switch out the glass pane.

3. Stuck Windows

Paint accumulation, deformed wooden frames, or dirt in the tracks can trigger windows to jam.

- **The Fix:** Thoroughly clean the tracks and use a silicone-based lubricant. If the wood has swollen due to humidity, careful sanding might be required once the wood dries out.

Common Door Problems and Solutions

Doors experience mechanical stress from consistent opening, closing, slamming, and twisting.

1. Squeaky or Sagging Hinges

In time, the weight of a heavy door pulls on the hinge screws, triggering the door to sag and scrape against the floor or frame.

- **The Fix:** Tighten loose screw holes by changing brief screws with longer ones that reach into the tough wall stud. For squeaks, apply a couple of drops of light-weight maker oil or silicone spray to the hinge pins.

2. Harmed Door Jambs and Wood Rot

Exterior doors exposed to heavy rain frequently suffer from wood rot at the bottom of the jambs and limit.

- **The Fix:** For minor rot, scrape away the decayed wood, treat the location with a wood hardener, and fill it with outside wood epoxy. If the rot is substantial, the entire jamb assembly must be changed.

3. Faulty Latches and Locks

If a door declines to stay latched, the strike plate on the frame is most likely misaligned with the latch bolt.

- **The Fix:** Unscrew the strike plate and utilize a file to increase the size of the hole, or rearrange the plate slightly up or to align completely with the latch.

Repair vs. Replacement: Making the Right Call

Not every problem requires a brand-new installation. Use the following guide to determine whether to repair or change your fixtures.

Component	Minor Issue (Repair)	Severe Issue (Replace)
Windows	Drafty seals, damaged locks, peeling paint	Rot-gutted frames, split structural glass, serious warping
Doors	Squeaky hinges, misaligned locks, peeling surface	Splintered wood, hollow-core damage, shattered glass panels
