- Players are typically provided a choice of 2 items out of 4, which typically consists of one weapon case and a mix of graffiti or lower-tier weapon skins.

Drop Pools Explained

The case drop swimming pool is divided into two distinct categories:

1. **Active Drop Pool:** Cases currently dropping actively to gamers who play the video game. When Valve launches a new case, an older active case is generally moved to the uncommon drop pool.
2. **Unusual Drop Pool:** Cases that no longer drop regularly. They have an exceptionally low opportunity (estimated at around 1%) of dropping to gamers at the end of a match. Because of their scarcity, these cases frequently value in worth gradually.

3. CS2 Case Drop Rates and Rarities

Whenever a gamer opens a CS2 case, a server-side random number generator (RNG) determines the outcome. Valve is transparent about the relative rarity tiers of the items inside, though the specific product within a tier is evenly random.

Rarity Tier Approximate Drop Rate Description **Mil-Spec (Blue)** ~ 79.92% The most typical items in any case. Normally worth pennies. **Limited (Purple)** ~ 15.98% Uncommon skins with a little more complex styles. **Classified (Pink)** ~ 3.20% Rare weapon surfaces, typically forming the bulk of a case's worth. **Covert (Red)** ~ 0.64% The highest standard weapon tier. Highly in-demand. **Unique Rare (Gold)** ~ 0.26% Knives or Gloves. The holy grail of case opening.

*Note: There is likewise a [Case Opening](#) roughly 10% possibility for any weapon skin dropped to be in **StatTrak™** condition, which tracks kills made with that weapon.*

4. Drift Values and Exterior Conditions

Unpacking a skin is only half the fight; the physical condition of the item drastically impacts its value. CS2 uses a **Float Value** system, ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, to identify wear and tear.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Immaculate, very little scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight acnes)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear, scratches)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, often exposing distinct patinas)

Some skins look almost similar in Field-Tested as they do in Factory New, while others look greatly degraded. Smart traders and collectors pay very close attention to float caps when examining case pulls.

5. Popular CS2 Cases to Watch

Throughout the years, dozens of cases have been released. Some have ended up being legendary due to their contents or investment potential.



- **The CS: GO Weapon Case:** The initial case that began the skin economy. Extremely rare and costly.
- **Operation Broken Fang/ Riptide Cases:** Notable for containing some of the cleanest glove surfaces and high-tier representative skins.
- **Dreams & Nightmares Case:** Community-voted case including sensational, psychedelic, and dynamic styles.
