If a user is caught participating in these activities, they run the risk of a long-term ban from the Steam platform, resulting in the loss of their entire stock and game library.
- **Phishing and Malware:** Many unauthorized gambling websites are centers for malicious software, phishing links, and bot-driven scams targeted at taking account credentials.
