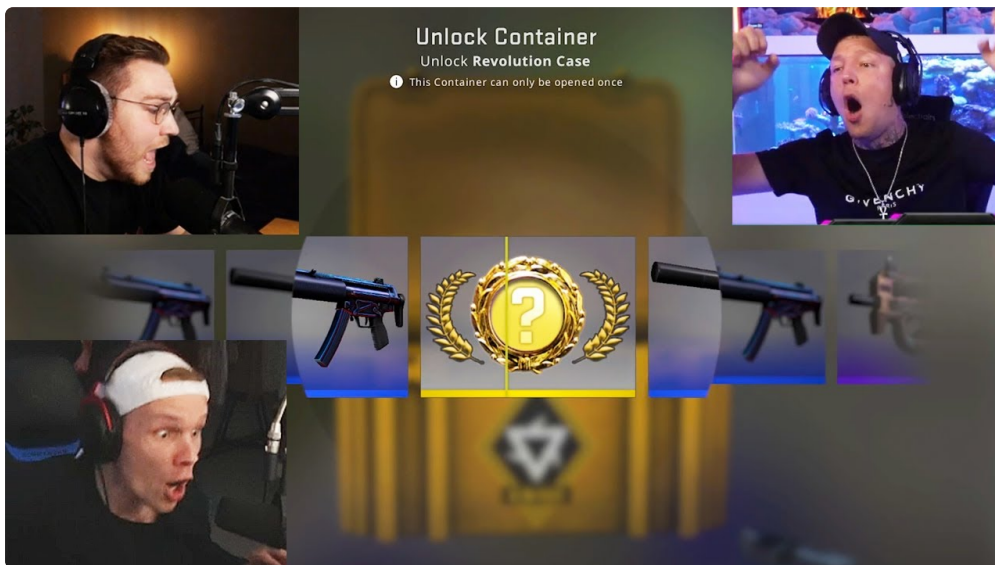
Popular Case Battle Game Modes

- **Adhere to a Budget (Bankroll Management):** Never bet more than you can afford to lose. Select a fixed session limit before entering your first lobby.
