

Westhampton Beach has always had a way of balancing polish with plainspoken character. That tension is part of what makes the village so compelling. The storefronts along Main Street feel lively without being slick, the waterfront still reminds visitors that this is a place shaped by tides and weather, and the historic structures scattered through the area give the whole community a sense of continuity that is hard to fake.
