Wear does not degrade in time in CS: GO; rather, it is completely appointed upon unboxing. The float value (varying from 0.00 to 1.00) identifies the wear condition:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Minimal to no noticeable scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight acnes)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear and tear)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely used, sometimes humorous or unique appearance)

StatTrak™ Items

Any weapon unboxed has a roughly **10% opportunity** of being a StatTrak™ variant. These items feature a small LED screen embedded on the weapon that tracks the variety of validated eliminates made by the player using that particular gun. Normally, StatTrak™ weapons command a greater price on the marketplace, though exceptions exist for particular high-tier [Case Opening](#) collector knives.



The Economics of the Case Market

The financial community surrounding CS: GO cases is fascinating since it runs largely independent of Valve, driven entirely by supply and demand from the player base.

Aspects Influencing Case Prices
