- Maintain at least a 24-30 inch spacing between sconces.
- Ensure the wood frame doesn't overlap or create shadows on lighting fixtures.

Electricians must be looped in early to add feeds for recessed or hardwired LED mirrors. Consultation with glaziers guarantees the glass and frame mount compatibly with this wiring.
