Use Ratings and Float Values

Opening an uncommon skin is just half the battle; the condition of the skin drastically impacts its visual look and market price. The video game designates every skin a **Float Value** varying from 0.00 to 1.00, which positions the product into one of 5 outside categories:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Minimal to no wear)
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Minor scratches or imperfections)
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.37 (Noticeable wear and tear)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.37-- 0.44 (Significant wear on paint and edges)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Heavily damaged, sometimes modifying the skin entirely)

The Economy: Supply, Demand, and Discontinuation

The virtual economy surrounding weapon cases mirrors the real life. Valve classifies cases into various drop swimming pools:

- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases presently dropping to gamers actively playing the video game.
- **Unusual (Discontinued) Drop Pool:** Older cases that no longer drop frequently to active players. They drop at a very low rate (approximated under 1% chance per drop) to a small portion of gamers weekly.

As active cases move into the rare drop pool, their supply becomes finite. If the gamer base continues to open them, the overall number out there decreases. According to basic financial principles, if demand stays consistent or boosts while supply diminishes, the cost of the case escalates.

Factors Influencing Case Prices

- **Age of the Case:** Older cases are scarcer.
- **Contained Items:** Cases including precious knives (like Karambits or Butterfly Knives) or iconic weapon skins (like the AK-47 Redline or M4A4 Howl) command greater prices.
- **Esports and Tournament Relevance:** Cases launched throughout specific Majors often get historical value.

- **Shop As Investments (Alternative Strategy):** Many players prefer to buy inexpensive active-pool cases in bulk and hold them for several years, banking on them transferring to the rare drop pool and appreciating in value.
