- **Coin-flip Duels:** A direct head-to-head match where 2 players wager equal skin values on a digital coin toss.

How Third-Party Platforms Operate

Since Valve restricts direct monetary transactions for skin cash-outs within its own API, third-party gambling sites rely on creative workarounds.

Generally, users log into a gambling website using their Steam qualifications. To deposit funds, players transfer CS2 skins from their Steam stock to a bot managed by the gambling platform. The site then credits the user's account with internal currency or site <https://csgamblingsite.com/> coins. When gamers desire to cash out, they utilize those coins to acquire other skins from the site's bot inventory, which are then traded back to the player's Steam account.

- Prohibited countless accounts related to commercial gambling operations.

Regardless of these efforts, the marketplace constantly adapts, finding new ways to bypass restrictions.
