These items are cost a repaired, low rate (typically between £ 0.99 and £ 2.99 GBP). As soon as the weekly store closes, these items can no longer be purchased straight from the developer, starting their life on the secondary market.

The Steam Community Market

As soon as purchased, gamers can trade or sell their skins on the Steam Community Market. Prices are dictated totally by supply and need:

- **High Demand, Low Supply:** Skins that look extraordinary or come from popular creators can skyrocket in value.
- **Low Demand, High Supply:** Over-printed or undesirable skins frequently sell for just a couple of cents.

Some uncommon and discontinued skins have attained famous status, with single items trading for hundreds-- or perhaps thousands-- of dollars.

Popular Skin Categories in Rust

Fitting directly into the post-apocalyptic lore of *Rust*, scrap-metal skins make equipment appearance rusty, jagged, and aggressively patched together. They feature barbed wire, alerting tape, and threat symbols.
