- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To decrease the fast transfer of skins in between accounts, Valve presented a seven-day trade hang on items traded from user stocks. This severely interfered with the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal models that gambling sites trusted.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has legally forced prominent platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot away from utilizing Steam-related infrastructure.

In spite of these steps, operators continue to adjust by using peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.
