- **Visual Appeal:** Skins with special visual effects, tidy iron sights, or high-demand color combinations usually command higher prices.

Popular Skin Categories and Their Utility

1. Camouflage Skins

- **Buy During Steam Sales:** Major seasonal Steam sales often trigger a minor dip in skin prices as players liquidate properties to buy video games. This can be an ideal time to swoop in and get discounted items.
