- **Active vs. Rare Drop Pools:** Valve frequently rotates cases. Active cases drop frequently after matches, while older cases move into the "unusual drop swimming pool," implying they drop very rarely (approximately a 1% chance after a match), triggering their market rates to increase in time.

Understanding Weapon Rarities and Odds

Every weapon skin and special product inside a CS: GO case is appointed a specific rarity tier. These tiers dictate not just the visual style of the item but also the mathematical possibility of unpacking it.

Additionally, every weapon skin dropped from a case includes a **Wear Rating** (Float Value), determining its condition from *Factory New* to *Battle-Scarred*, alongside an opportunity to be *StatTrak*™ (an integrated counter that tracks eliminates made with the weapon).

1. The CS: GO Weapon Case

Released in 2013, this is where all of it began. It introduced renowned community-designed classics like the **AWP|Lightning Strike** and the original batch of knife surfaces. Today, unopened variations of this case trade for numerous dollars.

2. Operation Bravo Case

Introduced along with Operation Bravo, this case featured the legendary **AK-47|Fire Serpent** and the **Desert Eagle|Cobalt Disruption**. It remains one of the most popular collector items in the video game.

3. Chroma Case Series

Introduced in 2015, the Chroma cases brought bright, futuristic surfaces to the video game and debuted new knife types, including the Karambit, M9 Bayonet, and Butterfly Knife versions with marble and Doppler finishes.

4. Prisma Case Series

Known for presenting lively, vibrant skins like the **M4A4|Emperor** and the **Five-SeveN|Angry Mob**, Prisma cases also included the Horizon knives with coveted finishes like Emerald and Sapphire.
