StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this innovation include an orange LED counter that tracks the number of confirmed eliminates made with that specific weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages:** These are dropped during official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and function gold sticker labels representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how frequently they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.

4. **Limited (Purple):** Often forms the base components for trade-ups.
5. **Categorized (Pink):** Highly detailed, preferable mid-tier skins.
6. **Covert (Red):** The highest standard rarity discovered in cases, including the most elaborate designs.
