1. Outside Wear Conditions

A skin's outside condition does not break down through usage; rather, it is arbitrarily assigned when the skin is unboxed or dropped, and it stays static permanently. The 5 official wear conditions are:

- **Factory New (FN):** Pristine condition with little to no visible blemishes.
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** Slight scratches or small paint chipping, generally just noticeable upon close inspection.
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** Moderate wear; obvious scratches and fading on the weapon's body.
- **Well-Worn (WW):** Significant wear, with large portions of the paint missing or greatly scuffed.
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Extreme wear. The weapon often looks battered, rusted, or seriously faded, though particular skins actually look appealing in this condition (typically described as "black-grind" or "battle-scarred gems").

2. Weapon Rarities

Skins are classified into different rarity tiers, which determine their drop rates in-game or from weapon cases:

Rarity Tier Color Code Description **Customer Grade** White Common, basic weapon surfaces. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Somewhat uncommon drops. **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Standard tier found in most weapon cases. **Restricted** Purple Higher-tier items, frequently functioning as trade-up food. **Categorized** Pink Unusual, highly desired weapon surfaces. **Covert** Red The highest basic weapon tier in cases (leaving out knives/gloves). **Extraordinary** Gold Very unusual items, consisting of Knives and Gloves.

Drift Values and Pattern Indices

Beyond wear conditions, 2 surprise technical metrics heavily affect a skin's rate: **Float Value** and **Pattern Index**.

- **Float Value:** A decimal number between 0.00 and 1.00 that determines the specific wear of a skin. For example, a skin may be "Field-Tested," however if its float is 0.1501, it is ideal on the border of Minimal Wear and will command a higher cost than a Field-Tested skin with a float of 0.37.
- **Pattern Index:** Many skins include procedural generation, meaning the texture is mapped in a different way depending on a seed number (1 to 1000). Famous examples include the *Case Hardened* series, where particular seed numbers develop vast amounts of blue on the weapon surface ("Blue Gems"), driving costs up significantly.

How to Acquire CS2 Skins

There are several primary techniques for constructing a CS2 inventory, each with its own advantages and disadvantages:

1. **In-Game Drops:** Simply using official or community servers grants weekly care bundles including weapon drops, graffiti, or cases.
2. **Opening Cases:** Players can buy keys to open weapon cases. While this provides the adventure of possibly unboxing a rare knife, the chances are greatly stacked against the player.

- **Never click unapproved login links:** If a website asks you to visit through Steam, double-check the URL to ensure it is the main Steam domain.
- **Beware of API Scams:** Do not log into third-party trading sites that require you to create or share your Steam Web API key.
- **Use Steam Guard:** Always have two-factor authentication allowed by means of the Steam Mobile Authenticator.
