- **Account Bans:** Users caught utilizing their Steam inventories for business gambling operations run the risk of having their personal Steam accounts permanently prohibited, resulting in the loss of their whole game and skin libraries.

Despite these efforts, the need remains so high that new platforms continuously emerge to change those that shut down.
