

Picking the right horse feed for broodmares begins from one clear goal: maintain pregnancy, foaling, and lactation without adding extra digestive or metabolic stress. A broodmare's nutritional requirements change over time, and the best ration is not always the one with the most calories. It is the one that delivers the right balance of protein, amino acids, minerals, fiber, and energy density while keeping the mare in a healthy body condition score.
