4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once purchased, items get in a 7-day trade cooldown, after which players can purchase, sell, or trade them freely on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

Unlike many video games where cosmetic items are bound to a player's account forever, Rust skins have real-world liquidity by means of the Steam Wallet (and third-party marketplaces, though care is encouraged). Costs vary based on supply, demand, and overall player count.

Specific uncommon skins have accomplished legendary status, commanding hundreds or even thousands of dollars. The economy is driven by shortage; as soon as a weekly store rotation ends, Facepunch seldom re-releases those specific items, implying the total supply is forever topped.
