The Regulatory and Legal Landscape

The intersection of video games, minor gambling, and unregulated financial markets has drawn significant attention from governments, regulative bodies, and Valve itself.

Valve's Crackdown

In 2016, Valve provided official cease-and-desist letters to dozens of significant skin gambling sites, specifying that these platforms were breaching the Steam Subscriber Agreement by utilizing OpenID and industrial APIs for industrial gambling purposes.
