- **The Fix:** For painted windows, carefully run an energy knife along the paint seal. For wood windows inflamed by humidity, avoid requiring them; instead, use a silicone-based lubricant or wait on drier weather before planning to aircraft down the edges.

Common Door Issues and How to Address Them

Doors take a pounding from consistent opening, closing, slamming, and moving structures.

1. Sticking or Sagging Doors

A door that drags out the flooring or declines to latch effectively typically has loose hinges or has actually shifted in addition to the home's foundation.

4. How frequently should exterior caulking be changed?

Top quality outside silicone or polyurethane caulking normally lasts between 5 to 10 years. However, its life-span depends heavily on the home's environment and direct exposure to severe sunlight and severe temperatures. Inspect caulking yearly and spot or replace as needed.
