The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Visible wear and scratches, stabilizing affordability and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Significant paint chipping and heavy wear patterns.

- 5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily degraded, in some cases looking rusted, weathered, or nearly totally removed of paint.

Note: Certain skins-- such as the well-known AWP|Asiimov-- do not spawn in Factory New condition, making their most affordable possible wear states incredibly uncommon and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital assets runs likewise to a real-world stock exchange. Prices are determined purely by supply and need, influenced by numerous key aspects:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a popular esports professional starts using a particular skin throughout a major tournament, the demand for that item normally surges over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping particular older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins contained within them-- dwindles, triggering rates to increase naturally gradually.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next higher tier, burning products out of blood circulation and permanently changing supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations introduce brand-new thematic collections, temporarily flooding or moving the focus of the marketplace.
