How Does an iGaming Aggregator Work?

At its core, an aggregator functions as a middleware layer. It sits in between the casino operator's video gaming platform (Player Account Management or PAM system) and the video game service providers' servers.

When a gamer clicks on a video game within an online casino, the following sequence takes place in milliseconds:

1. **The Request:** The gamer introduces a video game. The demand goes from the gambling establishment frontend to the aggregator's API.
2. **The Translation:** The aggregator equates the request and communicates with the specific video game service provider's server where the video game is hosted.
3. **The Execution:** The video game loads. When the player places a bet, the aggregator manages the financial transaction loop-- deducting funds from the gambling establishment's gamer wallet and crediting payouts back safely.

This smooth communication ensures that gamers experience absolutely no latency, despite which studio produced the video game they are playing.
