4. **Devices Lose Power:** The dashboard lights, radio, or cooling flicker or stop working to switch on when the key is turned to the "device" position.
5. **Key Gets Stuck:** Once the car is turned off, the key can not be removed from the ignition cylinder.
6. **Hot Key or Cylinder:** The metal key or the ignition location feels uncommonly hot to the touch after driving, indicating an electrical short.

What You *Should* Do:

1. **Put the car in Park (or Neutral for handbooks)** and engage the emergency brake.
