4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.37-- 0.44 (Significant wear on paint and edges)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Heavily damaged, often modifying the skin entirely)

The Economy: Supply, Demand, and Discontinuation

- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases presently dropping to gamers actively playing the game.
