Repairing a Drafty Window

1. **Break the Paint Seal:** Slide an energy knife thoroughly along the interior joint where the window sash fulfills the frame to slice through dried layers of paint.
2. **Tap Gently:** Use a wood block and a hammer to carefully tap the sash upwards or inwards to break it totally free. Avoid striking the glass directly.
3. **Clean the Tracks:** Vacuum out dirt, particles, and dead insects from the tracks. Clean them down with warm, soapy water.
4. **Lube:** Spray a silicone-based lube (prevent oil-based items, which draw in dust and gunk) onto the tracks and pulleys.
