Rarity Tier Color Representation Approximate Drop Rate **Mil-Spec (Base)** Blue ~ 79.92% **Restricted** Purple ~ 15.98% **Classified** Pink ~ 3.20% **Covert** Red ~ 0.64% **Special Rare (Knife/Gloves)** Gold ~ 0.26%

*Note: There is likewise a roughly 10% possibility that any opened product will feature the "StatTrak" technology, which tracks the number of kills made with that weapon.*

As the table shows, hitting the "Gold" tier-- a knife or pair of gloves-- is exceedingly rare, happening in roughly 1 out of every 400 case openings.

### 1. Active vs. Rare Drop Pools

### 2. Trade-Ups

If a player accumulates a lot of low-tier skins (Mil-Spec, Restricted, or Classified), they can make use of the **Trade-Up Contract**. By compromising 10 weapons of the exact same rarity tier, the player gets 1 weapon of the next greater rarity tier from the collection of their option. This mechanic helps manage the supply of high-tier skins and offers value to unwanted drops.

### 3. The Steam Market and Third-Party Sites

While the Steam Community Market is the best and most managed location to buy and offer cases and skins, a robust community of third-party trading sites exists. These platforms permit cash-out options, peer-to-peer trading, and advanced market analytics.

## Tips for Managing Your CS2 Case Inventory

For those who take pleasure in the enjoyment of opening cases or desire to get involved in the economy responsibly, here are a few best practices:

- **Set a Budget:** Treat case openings like home entertainment or going to a gambling establishment. Never spend cash you can not pay for to lose.
