The most common condition. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Considerable wear, heavy scratching, and visible paint cracking. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Exceptionally worn, rusted, or faded. Often valued for distinct "blackimov" impacts.

Note: Some skins are "capped," meaning they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions incredibly uncommon and expensive.
