- **The Tempered Series:** Known for its metallic, heat-treated rainbow shine looking like burnt exhaust pipelines, the Tempered collection (specifically the Tempered AK-47) is a timeless classic.
- **Big Grin (Metal Facemask):** One of the most recognizable and pricey specific items in the game, featuring an enormous, distorted smile.
- **Splendor Series:** Sleek, futuristic styles featuring dynamic neon accents that appear dark environments.

How to Acquire Rust Skins

- **Official Rust Item Store:** Updated every Thursday along with game spots, this is the least expensive location to purchase freshly released skins before they struck the community market.
