A forced-air furnace in a 1970s split-level does not fail the same way as a hydronic boiler in a pre-war stone colonial. A heat pump serving a newer addition may struggle for reasons entirely different from a gas furnace with dirty burners and weak airflow. That is why fast repair alone is not enough. What Does Southeastern Pennsylvania Winter Do to Heating Systems?

Southeastern Pennsylvania winters expose weak heating systems by combining freezing outdoor temperatures, damp air, old construction, and sudden temperature swings. AFUE (Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency) — the percentage of fuel a furnace or boiler converts into usable heat — becomes more than an efficiency rating in homes with aging equipment. Standard older furnaces often operate around 80% AFUE, while high-efficiency condensing furnaces can reach 95% AFUE or higher. But even a high-AFUE system performs poorly when airflow, combustion, venting, or thermostat control is compromised.

In reviewing service patterns across Montgomery County and nearby Bucks County communities such as Warminster, Doylestown, Richboro, and Southampton, one recurring issue is mismatched heating equipment. Some homes have older ductwork that was never designed for today's variable-speed systems. Others have finished basements or additions that changed airflow balance without a corresponding ductwork redesign.

CFM (cubic feet per minute) is the measurement of how much air a blower moves through the system, and poor CFM can overheat a furnace, trip limit switches, and leave rooms cold even when burners are firing. A dirty filter with the wrong MERV rating can be part of the problem. MERV rating — Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value — measures how effectively an air filter captures airborne particles, but a filter that is too restrictive for the system can choke airflow.

Combustion analysis is another critical step. Combustion analysis is a professional test that measures how safely and efficiently fuel is burning inside a furnace or boiler. It can identify excess carbon monoxide, improper gas pressure, draft issues, and incomplete combustion before those problems become dangerous. This is not a place for homeowner experimentation.

A heat pump that performs well in October may struggle during a polar vortex event if it was not sized or maintained correctly.

The Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code (UCC) establishes statewide construction and system safety requirements, while the International Mechanical Code (IMC) and International Fuel Gas Code (IFGC) guide proper installation, venting, combustion air, and equipment safety. NFPA 54, also known as the National Fuel Gas Code, provides additional fuel gas safety standards that matter whenever technicians work on gas-fired furnaces and boilers.

Have you noticed your furnace running longer each winter even though the thermostat setting has not changed? That symptom can point to duct leakage, improper gas pressure, failing blower performance, dirty burners, poor insulation, or a thermostat calibration [emergency heater repair spring house](#) issue. For gas furnaces, age is a practical starting point. A well-maintained furnace may last 15 to 20 years, but repeated repairs after that point deserve scrutiny. If the heat exchanger is cracked, replacement is usually the responsible decision because the heat exchanger separates combustion gases from indoor air. A cracked heat exchanger can create carbon monoxide risk and should never be ignored.

For boilers, the calculation is different. Cast-iron boilers can last for decades, but pumps, controls, expansion tanks, relief valves, and near-boiler piping may fail long before the boiler block itself. A 25-year-old boiler with sound combustion and good water-side condition might justify repair; a leaking, inefficient, poorly vented boiler may not.
