It is worth noting that some skins are hardcoded to never appear in certain conditions. For instance, a specific skin might just exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental weapon surfaces.
