To open a case, a gamer requires 2 things:

1. **The Case itself:** Earned as random drops through weekly gameplay or purchased straight from the Steam Community Market.
2. **A Key:** Purchased exclusively in-game for a repaired cost of £ 2.50 GBP.

As soon as opened, the player receives a single cosmetic product picked at random from the case's predefined drop swimming pool.

The Mathematics of Rarity: Understanding Drops

The attraction of weapon cases is rooted in likelihood. Every item inside a case belongs to a specific rarity tier, which straight correlates to its drop rate. Valve, the video game's designer, does not officially release specific percentages, but extensive neighborhood information mining and analytical analysis over the years have exposed the approximate chances.

(Note: There is also a little possibility of receiving a "StatTrak" variation, which tracks the number of kills made with that weapon. StatTrak items share the exact same base rarity drop rates but have a separate, rarer roll within those tiers.)

Types of Weapon Cases

Over a decade of updates, Valve has launched dozens of cases. They usually fall under 3 distinct classifications:

- **Active Drop Pool Cases:** These are currently dropping to players actively playing on authorities or neighborhood servers.

- **Rare Drop Pool Cases:** Older cases that no longer drop frequently after matches. Instead, they drop at an extremely low rate (estimated under 1% of the time) to an extremely small number of players.
- **Commemorative/ Major Cases:** Souvenir bundles dropped to viewers enjoying official CS: GO/CS2 Major tournaments. These do not require secrets to open.

Popular Historical Cases

- **The Operation Bravo Case (2013):** One of the earliest and most popular cases, including iconic skins like the Fire Serpent AK-47.
- **CS: GO Weapon Case (2013):** The extremely first case presented to the game, popular for containing the initial Weapon Case knives.
- **Prisma and Danger Zone Cases:** Modern classics that presented popular finishes and community-designed favorites.

The Virtual Economy: Supply and Demand

The economy surrounding CS: GO weapon cases behaves much like a real-world stock market. Since cases in the active drop swimming pool eventually move to the uncommon drop swimming pool, their supply ends up being limited.

As the active gamer base grows, the need for older, rarer cases boosts. When supply decreases and require goes up, rates skyrocket. For circumstances, cases that when sold for three cents in 2015 can now command upwards of £ 40 to £ 100+ on the Steam Community Market and third-party trading websites.

Key Economic Drivers:

- **Player Counts:** Higher concurrent gamer numbers mean more people opening cases, depleting the international supply.
- **Pro-Player Visibility:** If an expert player utilizes a specific skin throughout a major tournament, need (and price) for that skin-- and the case it comes from-- typically spikes.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, keeping demand for lower-tier case items relatively stable.

Tips for Navigating the Case Market

If you are planning to connect with the weapon case market, keep these finest practices in mind:

- **Treat it as Entertainment, Not Investing:** Opening cases is fundamentally gambling. Statistically, the large bulk of items opened deserve considerably less than the £ 2.50 expense of the key.
- **Purchase Singles Instead of Opening:** If you want a specific skin, purchasing it directly from the neighborhood market is often less expensive than attempting to unbox it.
- **Understand Storage:** If you plan on holding cases as long-term investments, bear in mind stock limits and the security of your Steam account (always make it possible for Steam Guard).
