The Step-by-Step Door Glass Replacement Process

Tools and Materials Needed

- Heavy-duty work gloves and safety glasses
- Duct tape or cardboard (for securely dealing with damaged shards)
- Utility knife or putty knife
- Crowbar or sculpt
- Replacement glass pane

Step 1: Safety First and Glass Removal

3. Clean the frame clean of dust and debris to guarantee an appropriate seal for the brand-new glass.

1. **Use new bed linen:** Lay a thin bead of silicone caulk or setting tape along the bottom and sides of the frame channel.
