

Hauppauge is one of those Long Island places that people pass through for years before they start noticing how much is actually going on there. It sits in the middle of Suffolk County with a practical, workaday reputation, a reputation shaped by office parks, major roadways, distribution centers, and a steady stream of commuters.
