Typical Door Issues and How to Fix Them

1. The Sticking Door

Humidity modifications typically trigger wood doors to swell, making them stick in their frames. Alternatively, loose hinge screws can trigger the door to droop.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes are removed, remove the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.
- **Step 2:** If the door still sticks, find the binding point by sliding a notepad along the space.
- **Action 3:** Sand or airplane the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to avoid moisture absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is an easy fix that yields pleasure principle.

- **Action 1:** Open the door and location a wedge below it for stability.
- **Step 2:** Tap the hinge pin upward utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Action 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, apply a lubricant (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- prevent cooking oils that attract dust), and tap the pin back into place.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door fails to stay shut, the latch bolt is likely missing out on the strike plate.

- **Action 1:** Apply lipstick to the latch bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, revealing where the latch is hitting.
- **Action 2:** Adjust the strike plate by unscrewing it and filing down the hole, or moving it a little up or to line up with the mark.

Common Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are essential for ventilation and natural light, however they are also main culprits for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts indicate abject weatherstripping or stopped working caulking around the window frame.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the outside perimeter of the window. If the old caulk is split or missing, scrape it away, clean the area, and apply a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Action 2:** For double-hung windows, replace damaged V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to produce a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

Paint accumulation or dirt tracks can glue a window shut.



- **Action 1:** Run an energy knife carefully around the boundary of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Step 2:** Tap gently along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and use a silicone-based lubricant to assist the window move smoothly.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *between* the 2 panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has actually failed. Unfortunately, this normally needs changing the glass unit (IGU) instead of the whole window frame.

Vacuum the track completely, clean it with warm soapy water, and use a silicone lubricant. If the door still struggles, the rollers below the door may need adjustment or replacement.
