- 5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily broken down, in some cases looking rusted, weathered, or nearly completely stripped of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the popular AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their most affordable possible wear states exceptionally rare and valuable.
