(Note: The chances of getting a StatTrak™ variation of any product are roughly 1 in 10 for each drop category).

As the table plainly reveals, the chance of unpacking a "Gold" (knife or gloves) is just over **one-quarter of one percent**.

The Economics of Unboxing: Expectation vs. Reality

From a financial standpoint, opening CS: GO cases is, usually, a losing proposal. Because the cost of a secret is fixed at £ 2.50, and the large bulk of products returned deserve less than £ 0.10, the expected roi (ROI) for a single case is generally approximated to be in between **40% and 60%**.
