Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, overcome the following troubleshooting actions methodically.

1. Verify the Integrity of Game Files

In time, video game files can end up being corrupted due to unforeseen system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or faulty storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to examine and replace missing out on or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and select **Properties**.
- Browse to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Await the procedure to finish (Steam will automatically download any damaged files), then reboot your computer.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or go to the main NVIDIA site to download the most recent Game Ready Driver.

- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes began instantly after a motorist update, use a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to totally wipe the old motorist before setting up a steady, older version.

3. Change Launch Options

Specific launch choices can require CS: GO to run in a more steady environment, bypassing intro videos or requiring specific DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, search for **Launch Options**.
- Enter the following advised steady commands (separated by areas):
 - -novid (Skips the introduction video, decreasing load-time crashes)
 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU concern)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and efficiency settings to default if the video game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

- Navigate to your CS: GO installation folder (generally C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- Locate the primary executable file (csgo.exe).

- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and inspect **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Look For Background Application Interference

Overlay software and hardware monitoring tools frequently hook into the DirectX pipeline of games, which can trigger abrupt crashes. Attempt disabling the following applications while playing:



- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party antivirus software (try including an exclusion for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If standard fixes stop working to solve the concern, the issue might lie deeper within your operating system or hardware setup.

1. Handling Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM provides a performance increase, CS: GO is infamously conscious hardware instability.

- If you have actually used an aggressive overclock, try calling it back to baseline factory specifications.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

2. Re-installing CS: GO Cleanly

Sometimes, remaining customized maps, out-of-date workshop items, or greatly modified configuration files cause persistent disputes.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand browse to the installation directory site (... steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and delete any staying folders.
- Reinstall a fresh copy of the video game.

Preventative Maintenance Checklist

- **Keep Windows Updated:** Install the most recent cumulative updates for your os.
