(*Note: Some skins look uniquely cool in BS, referred to as "Blackscars"*).

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™**: Items with this technology include an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of verified eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Souvenir Packages**: These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors) and function gold stickers representing the teams and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how frequently they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, standard drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, common in containers.
