Visual Categories and Playstyle Impact

While skins are purely cosmetic, particular designs can discreetly affect gameplay. Gamers often classify skins based upon how they carry out in the extreme, competitive environment of a *Rust* server.

Popular Aesthetic Styles

- **Camouflage Skins:** Designed to mix into specific biomes (snow, desert, or forest). Players often use green-themed or white-themed gear to hide in bushes or snowdrifts.
