- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has legally forced popular platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot away from utilizing Steam-related facilities.

Regardless of these procedures, operators continue to adjust by making use of peer-to-peer markets, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.
