A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the whole pot. High (Depends on the percentage of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Replicates the official Valve case openings, often with greater or tailored odds and unique prize pools. High (Typically unfavorable return to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Betting skins or cash on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live odds. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate risk)
