How CS2 Gambling Sites Operate

Unlike traditional online gambling establishments that generally use fiat currency (GBP, EUR) or cryptocurrencies, CS2 gambling sites run primarily through 2 systems:

- 1. P2P Skin Trading:** Players log in using their Steam accounts. When they want to deposit, the platform's bot starts a trade deal, or the site uses a peer-to-peer system where the gamer sends the skin directly to another user who bought site credit.

4. Financial and Psychological Risks
