What Are CS: GO Cases?

Weapon cases are virtual containers in *Counter-Strike* that hold weapon surfaces (skins), knives, and gloves. To open a case, players must obtain two things:

1. **The Case Itself:** Dropped randomly at the end of main matches, acquired through the Steam Community Market, or received through weekly profile rank rewards.
2. **A Weapon Case Key:** Purchased straight from the in-game store for £ 2.50 GBP (or equivalent local prices).

- **Operation Cases:** Released during particular limited-time operations. Once the operation ends, these cases join the rare drop swimming pool.

Popular CS: GO Cases Through the Years

Certain cases hold legendary status within the neighborhood due to their iconic contents, historical significance, or skyrocketing market worths.

1. **The Weapon Case (1 & 2):** The originals that began the trend. Consisting of legendary skins like the AK-47 Case Hardened and the original set of knife surfaces, unopened versions of these cases now trade for hundreds of dollars.

4. **Operation Breakout Weapon Case:** Famously consists of the Butterfly Knife, among the most popular knife models in the video game's history, driving its continual high market price.
