Beyond these standard tiers, items can likewise bear the **StatTrak™** technology, which digitally tracks the number of validated eliminates a player makes with that particular weapon, normally driving the cost up significantly.

The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

Among the most interesting aspects of CS: GO skins is that no two identical weapons look exactly the same. Every weapon is appointed a **Float Value** varying from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical condition or outside wear.

The wear worth is completely locked to the item when it is generated and does not break down further through usage.

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Pristine, flawless finish with very little to no scratches.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Minor blemishes or slight scuffs, usually only noticeable upon close examination.
3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Visible wear and scratches, balancing affordability and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Significant paint breaking and heavy wear patterns.

5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Greatly deteriorated, sometimes looking rusted, weathered, or almost completely removed of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the well-known AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their least expensive possible wear states remarkably uncommon and valuable.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital possessions runs similarly to a real-world stock market. Rates are determined simply by supply and need, influenced by several crucial factors:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports expert starts utilizing a specific skin throughout a significant tournament, the demand for that product usually surges overnight.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping specific older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins consisted of within them-- decreases, causing costs to rise organically gradually.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, burning items out of blood circulation and completely modifying supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations present new thematic collections, momentarily flooding or shifting the focus of the market.

Popular Weapon Families to Collect

For gamers aiming to begin a collection, particular weapon families have accomplished legendary status within the neighborhood due to their artistic design and status.

- **The Asiimov Series:** Instantly recognizable by its sci-fi, white, black, and bright orange geometric visual. Available on the M4A4, AWP, P90, and P250.
