Key Features of Modern Gambling Sites

- **Steam API Integration:** Users log in firmly through OpenID through Steam, enabling the platform to read their stock and facilitate trade offers instantly.
- **Cryptocurrency Support:** While many sites still depend on peer-to-peer (P2P) skin trading, a substantial part now accepts Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT, and altcoins to bypass rigorous valve restrictions.

- **Mass Trade Bans:** Valve has regularly targeted automated bot accounts used by gambling sites, banning thousands of accounts and rendering billions of dollars worth of skins unattainable.
- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To slow down the rapid transfer of skins in between accounts, Valve introduced a seven-day trade hold on products traded from user inventories. This severely interfered with the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal designs that gambling sites relied upon.

- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has legally pressured popular platform operators to close down their operations or pivot away from utilizing Steam-related facilities.

Despite these steps, operators continue to adapt by utilizing peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.
