Typical Window Issues and How to Address Them

1. Drafty Windows

A drafty window is a clear sign that the seal has actually stopped working or the weatherstripping has actually used down.



- **The Fix:** Inspect the boundary of the sash. If the weatherstripping is breakable or missing, scrape it away and use a fresh adhesive-backed foam or vinyl weatherstrip. For small gaps in the frame, a bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk will work.

2. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If wetness appears *between* the panes of a double-hung window, the insulating gas seal has actually failed.

- **The Fix:** Unfortunately, defogging kits are generally short-lived repairs. The most permanent service is to change the insulated glass system (IGU) or the entire window sash.

3. Stuck or Hard-to-Open Windows

Paint buildup, distorted wood, or a filthy track can cause a window to jam.

- **The Fix:** Clean out particles from the tracks utilizing a vacuum and a stiff brush. For wood windows stuck by paint, run an utility knife thoroughly along the paint seam. Lubricate sliding tracks with a silicone-based spray (avoid sticky lubes like WD-40, which draw in dirt).

Common Door Issues and How to Address Them

Doors swing, slide, and slam hundreds of times a week. As a result, their hardware takes a significant beating.

1. Squeaky or Stiff Hinges

A squeaking hinge is frustrating, but a stiff hinge locations unneeded tension on the door frame and screws.

- **The Fix:** Remove the hinge pin, wipe it clean with a rag, and use a few drops of light-weight maker oil or white lithium grease before reinserting the pin.

2. Doors That Stick or Won't Latch

If a door rubs versus the frame or declines to click into the strike plate, your home might have settled, or the hinge screws have actually loosened.

- **The Fix:** Start by tightening the screws on the top hinge. If the door still rubs, you might need to get rid of a thin layer of wood utilizing a hand plane or sander along the binding edge. If the latch misses the strike plate, moving the strike plate a little up or down usually fixes the problem.

3. Damaged Thresholds

The threshold (the sill at the bottom of an outside door) takes heavy foot traffic and consistent moisture exposure, leading to rot or denting.

- **The Fix:** Aluminum thresholds can often be changed through built-in screws that raise or lower the platform. Wood thresholds experiencing rot should be completely changed to avoid water from leaking into the subfloor.

Step-by-Step: How to Replace Door Weatherstripping

1. **Assess the Damage:** Open the door and check the foam, vinyl, or metal strips around the jamb. Search for tears, flattening, or gaps.
2. **Get Rid Of Old Material:** Pull or pry the old weatherstripping out of its kerf (groove) or peel away the adhesive support.
3. **Clean the Surface:** Wipe down the channel or frame with rubbing alcohol and a rag to get rid of dirt, old glue, and grime.
4. **Procedure and Cut:** Measure the leading and sides of the door frame. Cut the brand-new weatherstripping material to length utilizing energy shears or a hacksaw (if handling metal-backed strips).
5. **Install:** Press the new weatherstripping securely into the kerf groove, or peel the adhesive liner and stick it firmly against the stop molding. Close the door to ensure a snug, even seal without making the door tough to latch.

3. Why is my exterior door letting in light at the bottom?

This usually implies the door sweep (the rubber or vinyl flap attached to the bottom of the door) is broken, or the limit requires to be adjusted upward. Changing a door sweep takes less than 15 minutes and drastically cuts down on drafts.

4. How often should I carry out maintenance on my doors and windows?

House owners should perform a thorough assessment of all windows and doors a minimum of two times a year-- generally in the spring and fall. Look for smooth operation, lube moving parts, clear out weep holes in sliding windows, and check exterior caulking.
